“A Lecture in Memory of Erel Shalit” by Nancy Swift Furlotti

“He who possesses the world but not its image possesses only half the world, since his soul is poor and has nothing. The wealth of the soul exists in images.” C. G. Jung

Image, which is rooted in the soul and is its means of expression, is severely challenged in our present, postmodern era. How do we live "the conscious life" with this weakening connection, and how do we find our way to heal this cultural phenomena to "re-story the Self"? This presentation will look at these issues and more presented in Erel Shalit's latest posthumous book, *The Human Soul (Lost) in Transition at the Dawn of a New Era*. I will include a dream or two related to this material and look forward to having an engaging discussion on this important problem.

Nancy Swift Furlotti, Ph.D. is a Jungian Analyst in Aspen, Co and a member of C. G. Jung Institute of Colorado. She is a past President of the C.G. Jung Institute of LA, founding member and co-president of the Philemon Foundation, founding member of the Kairos Film Foundation and Mercurius Prize Committee. She is also a Pacifica Graduate Institute board member. Nancy is co-chair of the C. G. Jung Endowment at the Semel Institute at UCLA where the Jungian perspective is looked at in relation to neuroscience. She also serves on the board of FARES, Foundation for Anthropological Research and Environmental Studies, in Guatemala where she has a longstanding interest in Maya mythology and culture and preserving the last area of rainforest in Central America.

Nancy is President of Recollections, LLC, a company she founded with the late Erel Shalit to facilitate the translation editing and publishing of first generation Jungian analyst's unpublished works. Books published by her company include Erich Neumann's, *Jacob and Esau* and his forthcoming, *Roots of Jewish Consciousness: Volume 1, Revelation and Apocalypse; Volume 2, Hasidism*. This book will also be published in Hebrew.

She co-edited the book, *The Dream and its Amplification* with Erel Shalit and recently completed Erel Shalit's unfinished book, *The Human Soul (Lost) in Transition at the Dawn of a New Era*. She will also complete his final unfinished book, *The Dream, Fate and Destiny* by 2020 before moving on to finish her own book on the Quiche Maya creation myth, the *Popol Vuh*.

Keynote Address: “Watching and Waiting in the Wanderings of Life” by Kathryn Kuisle

In this world of speed and rapid change, watching and waiting often get forgotten or ignored. In this lecture, I will address the concept of watching, keeping vigil and waiting in our lives, in our analytical work and the individuation process, as well as the ritual of vigil that is an aspect the collective appears to need. Considering “vigil” as an archetypal image, I will explore its ancient presence and meaning found in myth, Scriptures, various cultures, and rituals, as well as pondering how in 2019, we need the richness of this ancient ritual of waiting and watching.

Kathryn Kuisle, Ph.D., is a Diplomate Jungian analyst and graduate of the C.G. Jung Institute, Zurich. She holds a Ph.D. in analytical psychology from Union Institute & University, Cincinnati, OH. She has a private practice in Colorado Springs, is the President of the C.G. Jung Institute of Colorado and is an affiliate faculty member for Regis University.

“Living the Imaginal Life” by Lara Newton and Jeff Raff

Living the imaginal life requires that we approach our life experiences, both inner and outer, not only with our rational mind but also with the imagination. In our culture imagination is usually considered to be both unreal and ego-created, but in some older cultures, in other religious traditions, as well as in poetry and Jungian psychology, imagination can be seen as a different way of perceiving and interacting with reality. This different way derives not from the ego but from a special psychic organ of perception and creation. Thus experienced, imagination can be seen as a creative act parallel to the creation of the universe – in other words, perceiving through the imagination creates something new in the world. By consulting the view of imagination held by poets such as John Keats, William Butler Yeats, and Dylan Thomas, by ancient alchemists, and by the Sufis, we can learn more of how imagination functions and how it can help us individuate and transform our consciousness.

In this presentation we will present alchemical and poetic information, as well as our own personal experiences of the imaginal life. We will invite the group members to participate in exercises of the imagination that can open our perception to this creative and energizing dimension of our existence.

Lara Newton, M.A. is a founding member of the C.G. Jung Institute of

Colorado (CGJIC) and serves as its Director of Training. She is also President of the C.G. Jung Society of Colorado. She has authored one book, *Brothers and Sisters: Discovering the Psychology of Companionship*, and various articles. She enjoys writing and teaching and has a private practice in Denver.

Jeff Raff, Ph.D. graduated from Bates College and earned his M.A. in Psychology from The New School for Social Research and his Ph.D. from Union Graduate School. He attended the C.G. Institute of Zurich from which he graduated in 1976. Moving to Colorado he has been in private practice in Denver since 1976. He is the former president, and a founding member, of the C.G. Jung Institute of Colorado to which he belongs as a Senior Training Analyst. He taught at the Institute and at Pacifica Graduate Institute and has given workshops on Alchemy and Active Imagination all over the country. He is the author of four books, including *Jung and the Alchemical Imagination*, and numerous articles.

“To Whom do You Pray. Cross Cultural Change from a Jungian Perspective, a Study of Zulu Healers, Traditional Isangomas and A.I.C. Prophets” by Margaret Johnson

In the 1990's my husband and I spent five summers in South Africa doing our own anthropological-psychological study of healers in the Zulu culture. I will share some of my experiences and thoughts about what we encountered there.

Margaret Johnson is a Jungian Analyst who trained in Los Angeles. She worked for some twenty years as a Jungian Analyst and is also active in the LA Institute. She moved to Colorado in 2016, lives on a ranch, rides horses, has a part time practice, and is still active in the C.G. Jung Study Center of Southern California, the Inter Regional Society of Jungian Analysts, and a co-chief Editor of *Psychological Perspectives*.
